## RUTH | BLESSED BE THE LORD WHO HAS NOT LEFT YOU WITHOUT A REDEEMER RUTH 4:1-22

Elimelech, Naomi, and her two sons left Israel during a time of famine and settled in neighboring Moab. While there Elimelech and his two sons died. Naomi was left with her two daughters-in-law. She pleaded with them to leave for what she thought was their own good. Orpah left, but Ruth clung to her and more importantly her God. When Naomi arrived back in her hometown Bethlehem, she was hopeless and empty. By the end of chapter three, Naomi was confident that Ruth and she would be taken care of by a man named Boaz. Boaz would either contact a redeemer who would provide for Ruth and indirectly Naomi or redeem them himself. God provided for Ruth and Naomi and He did not forsake them. The story of Ruth points to God's care for His people and a greater Redeemer that He would provide. How does the book of Ruth conclude and what are the characteristics of a redeemer?
